


There was a lot of information to cover but the day was broken up well with the small group activities, informal discussions and videos to make the information feel less bulky

Just for Kids Report on Criminal Exploitation and School

Exclusions

Excluded, Exploited, Forgotten - childhood criminal exploitation and school exclusions

Just for Kids Law has published a report on criminal exploitation and school exclusions. Findings of the report include: children outside of mainstream education are more vulnerable to becoming victims of criminal exploitation; children who have experienced exploitation will be more vulnerable to and disproportionately impacted by exclusion; some behaviour that leads to exclusion can be orchestrated by criminal factors to further that child's exclusion.

Independent Anti-Slavery Commissioner launches Annual Report 2019-20

The Independent Anti-Slavery Commissioner, Dame Sara Thornton, has published her [Annual Report for 2019-2020](#). The Annual Report outlines the Commissioner's work so far to achieve her objectives as outlined in the [Strategic Plan 2019-2021](#), within the four priority areas of: improving victim care and support; supporting law enforcement and prosecutions; focusing on prevention; and getting value from research and innovation. National Crime Agency (NCA) Project Aidant – Child Trafficking w/c 5th October 2020

The next Project Aidant national activity will take place w/c 5th October and is being led by Europol EMPACT (European Multidisciplinary Platform Against Criminal Threats). It is intended this activity will enhance and develop our knowledge in relation to child trafficking and exploitation of under 18s who have been trafficked to and within the UK.

Youth criminality toolkit

As part of the Early Intervention Youth Fund (EIYF) and Programme Precision, West Yorkshire Police have created a video toolkit to look at the current issues young people in our community may experience or have experienced around criminality. Concerns such as involvement in drugs, drug addiction and violence are discussed in a real life based format. The toolkit has been created to generate discussion between adults and young people. Home Office First Responder Training

The Home Office have released an online modern slavery training module for all First Responders. The aim of the training is to provide all First Responders with a consistent level of knowledge to enable them to effectively identify and refer, where appropriate, potential victims of modern slavery to the National Referral Mechanism (NRM). Although this training is aimed at First Responders, it contains useful information for all partners. Home Office Multi-Agency Assurance Panels – Expression of interest

As part of the NRM reforms that were announced in 2017, the Home Office introduced Independent Multi-Agency Assurance Panels to review negative conclusive grounds decisions. The purpose of these panels is to ensure that robust and consistent decisions are made within the NRM process. The panels of independent professionals, who have experience and expertise in working with victims of modern slavery, add an additional layer of scrutiny to negative conclusive grounds decisions made across the UK.

The Home Office is seeking additional representatives from the police/law enforcement agencies, local authorities and NGOs to take part in these panels.
